We live in extraordinary times. Something we can neither see nor hear is having an impact on our lives like nothing we have experienced before. Our beliefs, our faith, our trust, all that we hold dear is being tested like never before.

And amongst all the extraordinary ways our lives have been impacted, for me there are two things which stand out –

Firstly, we have been urged to exclude social interaction with other people. We have shut ourselves in our homes; if we do venture out we give other people a wide berth; we glare at anyone who comes too close. We are being very cautious. All this goes against our natural behaviour which is to be sociable and relate to each other. It is no wonder that many of us have learnt and come to rely on new ways of keeping in contact. We have kept in touch with family and friends using Facebook, Facetime, Zoom. This new technology has also given us new contacts, new friends. It has been a great way to reach out. I'm sure, now we know of it, we will want to continue to use it even when personal contact is allowed.



Secondly, we have come to realise that, as well as family and friends, there are some people whom we cannot do without. They are people we wouldn't give a thought to in 'normal' times. They are the taken-for-granted people. There's the N.H.S. of course, but really I'm thinking of the army of people who provide the basic services we cannot do without – the bin men, cleaners, carers, utility suppliers, transport drivers, etc.

Often they are the ones we demand the most from but who get paid the least. Remember how we clapped them on Thursday evenings? Hopefully we will maintain that appreciation for the future.

I recently came across a wonderful poem written by Benjamin Zephaniah. It's called People Need People. I would love to write it out for you but I don't want to infringe any copyright regulations. If you are able, do look it up. Here's the opening lines just to give you a flavour –

People need people,
To walk to
To talk to
To cry and rely on,
People will always need people.

Jesus was, and is, very much a people person; a man of the people one might say. Big on social interaction and being out amongst people. He appreciated people. He did, though, have particular affiliation with those at the lower end of society - the marginalised, the needy, the forgotten, the taken-for-granted.

Jesus was on earth in difficult times. His presence with us made it into extraordinary times. He spoke and led by example. Let us together follow that example, not just in these difficult times now but going forward in our own extraordinary lives. We need each other. People need people!

From the Vicarage

* The current arrangements for our Sunday services will continue for the foreseeable future. I am sure you realise that the situation is very fluid. Services at 10.00am at Christ Church and 11.00am at St. John with St. Mark are different from those we have experienced previously but this is a necessary part of the worldwide pandemic. Our midweek services are unchanged.

It has been good to welcome back those who have been shielding. From early August the Government announced that face coverings were mandatory for those attending public worship unless you have an exemption.

There are no restrictions on numbers attending worship providing that social distancing is observed. However, for baptisms, weddings and funerals numbers are restricted to 30.

Worship via the internet continues to be available and special thanks to those who regularly host the monthly Sunday@7 service and our friends at Seedfield Methodist Church for their weekly Sunday morning online services.

* At the funeral of Pauline Andrew at St. John with St. Mark in June, a collection was organised for the British Deaf Association. A total of £120 was sent and they have sent a letter thanking us saying that "such generous and valued support makes a real difference in the help we provide for Deaf people and Deaf communities throughout the UK". Thanks to all who contributed.

* Thanks also to those who have supported the Manchester Diocese's appeal to help those in our link Diocese of Lahore suffering from the effects of the coronavirus epidemic. This was featured in last month's magazine and more information can be found on the diocesan website. Please contact me if you wish to make a donation.

* The celebrations for the 250th anniversary of St.John's Church have had to be severely curtailed due to the Covid 19 situation. However it is hoped that a special service with the Bishop of Manchester can be held on Sunday 6 December. This will be a joint service for the congregations of both churches, beginning at 10.30am. Please put this date in your diary.

* The Bishop of Bolton has shared an uplifting reflection on the recent restrictions placed in Greater Manchester called "Do not lose heart". This can be seen via youtube or at www.manchester.anglican.org

* I continue to say Morning Prayer at 9.30am and Evening Prayer at 5.00pm on a daily basis. It is good to know that others are saying prayers at the same time as we join together in prayer.

* The Parish Office is back open – with the necessary social distancing! Enquiries about future baptisms or weddings / marriage banns etc, or any other matter, should be made at St.John with St.Mark Church Hall any Wednesday evening between 6.30-7.00pm.

* The Ministry Team consisting of all the Clergy, Licensed Readers and Authorised Lay Ministers meets every month – usually on the second Monday evening. If you have an issue that you would like us to discuss, please contact one of the team.

* Porch Boxes are always in need of food and toiletries especially in this current situation. A box is available at the back of both churches.

* Regular attenders to church are encouraged to join our planned giving scheme. If you would like to do so or would like some further information, please speak to one of the Treasurers.

During lockdown this free phone line was launched, by the Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby. By mid July the C of E website showed the line had received 173,000 calls from over 37,000 people – calls topped more than two million minutes.

The service – which is available 24 hours a day on 0800 804 8044 – was set up as a simple new way to bring worship and prayer into people’s homes, especially those unable to join online church services.

Archbishop Justin said: "Daily Hope has been a lifeline for tens of thousands of people in the last few months. We’ve heard stories of people using it who are regular church attenders and those who aren’t. That’s a testimony to the vital importance of Daily Hope.

I have been praying for those who have used the phone line, and written to us, that God would bring them comfort, not just at this time but in the weeks and months which follow.

The Church will continue to look to serve older people, and those who can’t easily get out to a church building.

I look forward to seeing how Daily Hope can go from strength to strength as lockdown restrictions are eased."

While measures begin to ease and church buildings begin to reopen, it's important that we remember the millions of people who may be vulnerable due to their health or their age, and who may be reluctant to return to their place of worship.

Callers to the line are welcomed with a short new greeting from the Archbishop before being able to choose from a range of options, including hymns, prayers, reflections, the meaning of hymns, and advice on COVID-19.

New material to the service continues to be updated, including mental health reflections voiced by Pam Rhodes as well as prayers from Mothers’ Union.



- * Although it seems far too early to mention the "C" word, some of you will be ready to order Christmas cards and there is a good selection – have a word with Hilary Riddick who is our representative and can order what you need.

The range is very reasonably priced but this year there is the addition of three extra designs, sold singly at £4.95. These allow you to send a gift-in-a-card with a biodegradable seeded paper greeting card. Included is a recycled envelope and planting instructions. These unique greetings cards can be planted in February or March to grow wild flowers essential for bees and butterflies. *100% of the profits go towards funding the life changing work of Mothers' Union with families around the globe.*

Whilst admittedly this year's calendars and diaries have not been well used, as life begins to return to normality, you are going to need 2021s – so check out the options.

Stepping out into brave new world?

By the time you read this, all being well, we shall be edging closer to being back to some kind of 'normal' life. But we are told it will be a 'new normal'. The world has taken a hefty knock. But we are finding that the experience of our Covid lockdown has given us time to reflect and reassess ourselves in relation to the world around us; what's really important; what matters; how we do things.



Some two thousand years ago, followers of Jesus were also in a lockdown - a crucifixion lockdown. When Jesus was arrested, nailed to a cross and then sealed in a tomb, the followers locked themselves away, terrified that the authorities would be coming for them next. But soon they were faced with the Risen Jesus and, with the fulfilment of the promise

of the Holy Spirit, came a renewed and refreshed outlook and focus. They realised that whilst there was a heritage of knowing God's ways, Jesus had shown them new things, new ways of life, new hope. This was not the time to go back but a time to go forward. A time to build on the old by embracing the new. Things had changed!

So, how are we feeling as we come out of lockdown? Do we see this as a time of change or are we going to carry on as before?

One thing which many of us have come to be thankful for during lockdown is the use of digital technology. On-line worship services on You-Tube; joining together via Zoom; automated phone lines such as "Daily Hope"; WhatsApp prayer groups. Even TV had more coverage of worship than usual. All these have been invaluable for some of us over the past months when we could no longer meet in the church building.

And this digital technology has not only allowed us regular church-goers to keep in touch; it has drawn in many others who, as often happens in times of crisis, became inquisitive and felt a need for prayer, for spiritual sustenance. They felt a longing, a thirst, to know more. And where did they look? They were on their mobile phones, their I-pads and their lap-tops.

Many more went on-line than would actually come to church buildings on an average Sunday. The building was closed - so God went out and was using new opportunities to be known. And many saw and heard. It may well be that as we open our church doors again that those who virtually dipped their toes in the waters may decide to test out the personal gathering of God's people. We may see new faces coming to join us. Let's welcome with joy any new arrivals. Hopefully, they like us, will be enriched in the coming together as one body, to worship and grow in faith as God's people.

But I think we have learnt during the lockdown period that there is also a place for the virtual, digital, worship platform – especially for those who are housebound or cannot get to the church building at the times we choose to open. It's both – not one or the other. Offline and online together.



Bishop David has said that the church faces an exciting time of change and transition; we need to grasp opportunities. The diocesan strap line "Church for a different world" is very apt for where we find ourselves now.

For some this may seem a daunting prospect; for all of us it will be challenging as we seek the road ahead. It was the same for those followers of Jesus two thousand years ago, but they responded to Jesus' call to go out and tell the world about him, empowered by the Holy Spirit. We can do the same; but we can't do it if we stay within our church walls. Let's be brave and step outside.
