I have recently had the experience of being flung into space! 'Velocity' at Penrhryn Slate Quarry in Wales is the longest zip wire in the Northern Hemisphere and the fastest in the world! 0-60 in 3 seconds with a top speed beyond 100mph.

I travelled with three friends so we had a feeling of mutual support between us. There was the support of the organisation that provided all the engineering and the equipment that made the event possible. Then the care and expertise of those who made sure our harnesses were correctly fitted and who attached us to the zip wire and then released us. It is humbling to think of all the work and effort that made the experience possible.

The quarry has been in operation for over 400 years. In the 19^{th} century, it was the largest slate quarry in the world – 1 mile long and 370 metres deep with 3000 workers. It was the site of the longest dispute in British industrial history. The workers were on strike demanding better wages and working conditions from 1900 until 1903.

Looking back at the moment I 'flew' over the edge of the quarry, over the water at the bottom, over the roadway, the buildings, and the people watching our descent, I contemplate the enormity of faith. We often talk about 'stepping out of the boat' or 'stepping out in faith', but rarely do we have the opportunity to feel faith in a physical way. I trusted the young people working there and in the strength of the harness, but it was the anticipation, the thought, that possibility, that stomach-churning feeling just before the step was taken and the safety catch was released that something could go wrong even though I knew deep down that I would be safe because the checks had all been done and many had gone before me. With God we know that He is there for us at every moment and that all things are possible with Him so we can be confident to step out but is our faith strong enough?

Another outing was the first of two Mission Community Prayer Walks led by Paul Sanderson. I have lived in the Bury area all my life but was taken to pastures new through residential areas, farmland and places where there has been industry in the past. It was a delightful walk with opportunities to talk, make new friends, pray and take refreshment both physically and spiritually.

Both experiences highlighted the ever-changing world and the constants that are required for fulfilment. Everything changes but God is constant.

There were the common themes of companionship, trust, and faith.



This Creation season is a time to reflect on our relationship with the environment — nature, and the place where we live — and the ways in which our lifestyles and decisions as a society affect the world around us.

It is increasingly important for us to treasure our heritage but change our attitudes and actions and make peace with Earth to preserve the bio diversity of God's creation and stop the ways of life that threaten the future.

This is a month of fresh starts. It is a time to renew our relationship with God, the creator and sustainer of all life. As we see the flowers and fruits around us, we find that they are now preparing for new beginnings. Seeds are developing. They will tumble to the earth or be flung there and are ready to restart the cycle of growth. Young people are completing stages of their education and are progressing to the next level. As one situation ends, another begins. God's creation is forever being renewed.

Summary of St John with St Mark PCC meeting - 4th July 2023

- The meeting was attended by Victoria Cook, Foundation Governor at St.
 John with St. Mark day school to talk about that role, as there is a
 vacancy there. There was an opportunity to ask Victoria questions and
 it was agreed to advertise this role on the weekly sheet to the wider
 congregation. The guidance from the Board of Education policy was
 looked at.
- Focal Leaders: Following a discussion and review of the role, it was decided not to appoint a focal leader role at the present time. A lot of the work required of a Focal Leader is currently being undertaken by different people.
- Mission Community: The latest various activities were discussed, including the meeting with Bishop Matthew of Bolton on 19th July. The More Than Sunday course has now concluded.
- Seedfield Housing: The proposal to build the new housing development has now been passed.
- Parish Profile: This has now been completed and will be approved at a joint meeting of both PCCs on 11th July along with the appointment of the representatives.
- The Pantomime finances and accounts have now been forwarded to the Treasurer and PCC and approved.
- 100 Club This is now up and running again and the first draw will take place at the beginning of July. There are expected to be two winners each month.
- Finance: The Summer Fair raised £1168; the card reader is now being used regularly; the fire extinguishers have been serviced and some work has been carried out in the toilets.
- Interregnum: The garden at the Vicarage has been tidied up and trees cut back, which has made a huge difference to the surrounds. The alarm and light timers have also been reset there; the Sunday reading and intercession rotas are becoming difficult to fill as people have recently stood down. Several members of PCC have volunteered to be involved in those duties going forward; it was noted that we have 5 Baptisms over the summer; Reverend Keith Trivasse is to stand down from taking services due to ill health and a celebration service will take place at Christ Church on Sunday 6th August.
- The next PCC meeting will be on Tuesday 12th September at 7.30pm.

Combined notes from the Christ Church PCC meetings held on 5 July and 3 August 2023.

It was decided that we would start again to take the collection starting with Family Service on 9 July.

The copper collection in church was discussed and it was proposed that this be stopped. There are few children to take a collection plus it sends out the signal that the Church is happy to receive just one's loose change rather than a committed level of giving. At the next meeting it will be decided which charity should receive the amount currently held.

Discussions were held regarding the visit of the new Bishop of Bolton to the Mission Community meeting in the church hall on the 19th July at 7.30pm. It was hoped that there would be a good attendance and refreshments will be available.

The faculty submission for the extension of the garden of remembrance is still being worked on.

The two new Christ Church Trustees, Geoffrey Hamilton and Pamela Hoyle, have been added to the Diocesan Patronage register.

The sale of Christ Church field is still with Bury Planning department.

The Baldingstone Trustees still need to be amended, both at the Charities Commission and Barclays Bank.

Safeguarding officer Cath Hilton outlined the results from a diocesan safeguarding meeting. She again encouraged all PCC members who have not yet done so to take at least the basic level training.

An email had been circulated regarding the Pilgrimage Walks, led by Paul Sanderson, which will take in all the churches in the Mission Community (a variation on Beating the Bounds). See page 13 for details of the second walk.

The Church Hall committee had raised a question regarding issues with woodworm and this matter is being dealt with by the Property committee.

It was decided to go ahead with the quote from Oak Tree services to have the tree in the tower removed. The possible removal of an Ash tree (on School Lane) and the associated issues with its removal were discussed. It was reported that 58 people attended the very successful Coronation Picnic.

The Fundraising committee is proposing a Christmas Tree Festival be held in church in December and were asked to advise the PCC of further details. A Scarecrow Festival at Harvest time was proposed. It was agreed to go ahead and passed to the fund-raising/social committee for further discussion. A quiz is planned for October 7th. It was noted by the lay chair that helpers were needed to assist the fund-raising and social committee in their efforts. Anyone from church can be co-opted onto one of the PCC committees.

The circulated notes from the recent 'Stepping Stones for Growth' event were discussed and the lay chair asked that everyone consider ways in which we use the suggestions here.

The school leavers' service from Springside School went well, and the pens presented to the leavers by Church were well received. Refreshments were organised at the end of the service. Whilst only a few stayed this was much appreciated.

Once again we were delighted to welcome the whole school for the Y6 Leavers' Service. The pupils leaving, mostly wearing their special sweatshirts, spoke enthusiastically about their memories of life at Springside (it has to be said that football featured strongly) and then used the story of the Billy Goats Gruff to consider how it felt to move

into the next stage of their lives. Miss Thornicroft presented each with an autograph album from school and for the first time we gave a gift from church, of a bamboo pen.

We served tea, coffee and biscuits to parents, grandparents and carers after the service which was much appreciated although many were off to work.

Our latest meeting of the Open Group took place on 12th July and we were pleased to welcome Nigel Silvester, who this year presented a talk on shipwrecks, particularly around the Isles of Scilly.

The Men of the Benefice have previously received this talk. We began the meeting with the reading of Jesus calming the storm and some prayer time thinking about our own storms of life.

There are many hundreds of wrecks in the area but this meeting focussed on just a small number, although the ones with the most interesting stories were told. The journey took us way back many centuries, to the most recent history, and was told with the aid of Nigel's ever reliable knowledge of the Islands, and of course his detailed map, which has now made many an appearance at different meetings across the Benefice.

Each wreck told their own story, through the eyes of those on board, those who survived, and the cargo and nationality of the ships. Despite the tragedies which unfolded, a few of us did sit up with some surprise when we discovered that, centuries ago, shipwrecks were a source of riches and treasure for local looters. Including the bodies that washed up, which had jewellery, clothing and valuable items removed from them.

The most recent disaster which Nigel included was the Torrey Canyon oil tanker in 1967. It was the environmental impact of this shipwreck that became the most reported piece and one or two of the group commented on their recollections of the reporting. For those that did not remember, there were of course some newspaper articles.

As is usually the case for a Nigel presentation, there was plenty of light-hearted moments as well with some water-based pictures from the family archives.

This was a fascinating talk on a subject which could have covered more, if time would have allowed us. Thanks to Nigel for putting this together and keeping us entertained.

Apologies for a busy schedule meaning an August meeting did not take place. However, the next two meetings will be as follows:

Wednesday 13th September – An open evening for people to bring an item they possess (clothing, ornament, book etc) which means something to them and talk briefly about it if you wish. This was written by the Revd Anne Marr, Mothers' Union Chaplain of Newcastle Diocese, following last year's event in Belfast, but it expresses something everyone one of us could well consider.



As a Deacon I was accustomed to being invisible. I asked my vicar, "What's it like for you to have a deacon in the team?" He thought a bit then said, "It's like having a pebble in my shoe." I wondered: 'Is this a compliment or a criticism?' Afraid of the answer, I didn't ask the question! I settled for accepting it as a 'spirit-gift', which I could unwrap some other time.

The next day, I had a pebble in my shoe. I was in a hurry, but the grit was sharp and forced me to stop. As I bent to unfasten my shoe, I saw an earthworm stranded on the paving, its skin beginning to dry. I picked it up and placed it on the soil. Without a word of thanks, it wriggled instinctively into the earth. I took off my shoe and shook out the offending stone...so tiny, I could barely see it. My spirit-gift was unwrapped.

25 years later at a MU Gathering in Belfast a bishop spoke about Mothers' Union being a 'pebble' in the church's shoes ... an irritant when things are not as they should be.

If we are pebbles that make walkers stop ... then we are enabling people to see what they would otherwise miss ... their personal 'earthworm' - perhaps a casualty in life, an issue to be addressed, an opportunity to be a good neighbour.

If we are pebbles, we don't have to be very big to make our point sharply — we simply have to be at the right place at the right time.

Ever wondered how a pebble gets into your shoe? Who puts it there? And why just then?

If we are pebbles, we are readily discarded as mere irritants. The secret of being an effective pebble is not to complain, but to shed light on an overlooked issue and be prepared to be a partner in resolving it.

As pebbles go, I don't profess to be a very effective one. I'm often too round and smooth and happy to nestle between the toes of those who carry me. Now and then, my sharp edges dig in, but I don't always see the result. But I am encouraged by the incisive qualities and achievements of many of the pebbles I have met in life.

Across the world there are godly pebbles working in situations of great need. Some of them are Mothers' Union members, working within teams to challenge despair and bring hope. You may never hear of them but they are there: pebbles challenging injustice and abuse; setting up literacy projects; visiting prisons and hospitals...

So be prepared to be a godly pebble in someone's shoe — whether shy or sharp - and leave the rest up to God. And be thankful for the pebble in your own shoe!


